Wisconsin Veterans Homes and Memorial Cemeteries

Fellow Post members, I recently shared a teleconference with the Secretary of Veterans Affairs and was very pleased to hear what Wisconsin is doing to keep our Veterans safe ... Al Secretary Mary Kolar's opening remarks on a teleconference April 24, 2020. Our Wisconsin Veterans Homes and Veterans Memorial Cemeteries continue to operate following new protocols from the Centers for Disease Control, the National Cemetery Administration, and the Wisconsin Department of Health Services.

I am grateful to be able to report that we continue to have **zero cases of COVID-19** at our Wisconsin Veterans Homes. This includes both staff and members. Over the past several weeks we have had some staff who have felt ill, who have not come to work, and have been tested. All were thankfully negative. We've also had some members who have gone to the hospital for unrelated illnesses who were tested as a precaution. Again, we are thankful none have been positive.

At the Homes, we continue to adhere to the guidance of the CDC, Department of Health Services, and others. This means we must continue to limit the number of people entering our facilities. Without a COVID-19 immunization or treatment, prevention is our primary tool to keep our members and our workforce safe. I understand this is hard on the members and their families, but we must do everything we can to keep everyone healthy.

At the Homes, we are also ensuring that we are prepared in the event we do get a case of COVID-19. There has been a lot of talk about Personal Protective Equipment in the news. At this time, we have an adequate supply of PPE for our staff, including masks and gloves. Current protocols require nursing staff to wear PPE. These protocols follow CDC requirements and take into account the lessons learned in other states with major outbreaks. We have the appropriate measures in place to request more PPE in the case of an outbreak. Further, we have taken steps to secure access to PPE to protect our supplies, but we have ample PPE available at this point.

Now, I'd like to briefly share with you what is happening at our veterans memorial cemeteries. We are following the lead of the National Cemetery Administration and observing their protocols. This means that we have temporarily discontinued committal services while continuing to allow families to witness their loved ones' interments. To ensure social distancing at the cemetery, we ask that there be no more than 10 family members at interments. Family and funeral directors are being asked to view the interment from their cars or the road very near their cars. They may approach the burial site once cemetery staff have left the area. We continue to work with families to schedule future memorial and/or celebration of life services.

When it comes to funeral honors, neither our state veterans cemeteries nor the national cemeteries are conducting full military funeral honors. That said, we can provide two uniformed service personnel to fold the flag and sound Taps with a digital bugle. However, if a family chooses, they can instead defer honors to a later date so that we can include the rifle detail. All veterans are entitled to honors and any family can request the service at a later date as part of a memorial service.
