***Below is part of a speech I gave several years ago called "The Flags of Sept. 11"
I think a lot of it still rings true today.***

I still do a lot of driving to the Legion's state headquarters in Portage. On the way there is an overpass where a lone U.S. Flag battered and bruised from years of weather and traffic still hangs. It first appeared there in those traumatic days after Sept. 11, when Americans, shocked and enraged by the terrorist attacks, expressed their sorrow and solidarity through this most eloquent of symbols.



It was our comfort, our rallying cry and so we put them everywhere, on our homes, office buildings, storefronts, on cars and on our bikes. There was a period of time, when you couldn't even buy a flag, because the stores couldn't keep up with the demand. Old Glory greeted us and lifted our spirits when we needed it most, appearing in all kinds of improbable places - like a highway overpass. But, where have all the flags of Sept. 11 gone?

As we remember the 3,000 men, women and children who were so cruelly taken from us on that crisp September morning, it is fitting to ask: What were the lessons of that day? The 9/11 attacks were carried out in a manner intended to inflict more than human loss and physical destruction. The shocking sight of passenger planes slamming into buildings was a calculated act of psychological terror. The attacks were meant to instill great fear, panic and confusion. Instead, the country reacted with anger, compassion and moral clarity. Hundreds of firefighters, police and ordinary citizens rushed to the scene giving their lives for the sake of others. United Flight 93, believed to be headed for the U.S. Capitol, became the first counterattack in the war on terror. In the blink of an eye, 40 unarmed citizens assessed their situation, took a vote and decided to take back the plane or die trying. Their decisive act of courage inspired an entire nation to follow their lead and do something!

Tens of thousands of volunteers stood in line for hours to give blood, while others saw a need and, on their own initiative, filled it. After the attacks, while the fires were still burning and the missing still unaccounted for, President Bush invoked the character of our nation, calling our unity a "kinship of grief" that hardened a "steadfast resolve to prevail against our evil enemies and all who supported them." We saw Congressmen and Senators from both sides of the aisle joining hands in unity, while waving the red, white and blue and singing "God Bless America" Where are those flags of 9/11 now?

No reflection about 9/11 or this nation's response to that day is complete without recognition of the commitment, accomplishments and heroic sacrifices of our military forces. We should all be very proud of our civilian soldiers. We need to give them and just as importantly their families all the support we possibly can. We must never lose sight of who we are in this long struggle, but we must not deceive ourselves into thinking that we can defeat this enemy armed with nothing more than lofty ideals and a sense of moral superiority.

I think President Teddy Roosevelt stated it well when he said, "Peace, like freedom, is not a gift that tarries long in the hands of cowards, or those too feeble or short sighted to deserve it." Our parents and grandparents secured the free world for us because they believed in something greater than themselves and were willing to put everything on the line to preserve freedom.

I do miss all the flags of Sept. 11th, but for me that ragged U.S. Flag hanging on that overpass is the one that stirs my heart. It has taken a beating, but it is still there. We must never forget that feeling of shock and horror and we must never forget how or why those 3,000 men, women and children died on September 11th, 2001.

Civilians, firefighters, policemen and soldiers our hearts and prayers go out to them and their families. But, we also owe it to them to make sure that we protect our Country's freedom of "Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness". We must stand together and never give up. Then maybe, just maybe, our children never have to ask "Where are the Flags of 9-11?"

Quote for replacement from Hennes Services is \$5,490. Al and Gary will work on possible lower price and removal of sales tax from quote. Also, Al will check with Tom Peterson regarding a possible insurance claim for the beer that has gone bad due to not being properly refrigerated.

Motion was passed to get the unit repaired.
